

Section 2: Descriptive Writing

Descriptive Writing

Did you know there were four different kinds of writing? You have been writing for a long time and most likely have used all four types. Even when you text your friends or family members, you might give information, share your opinion, persuade them to do something, tell them a story, or describe a place.

THE FOUR TYPES INCLUDE:

- **Expository:** inform or explain

- **Persuasive:** opinion to influence

- **Narrative:** story, fact or fiction

- **Descriptive:** paints a picture


The one type of writing that is most used along with the other three types is descriptive writing. When you explain or inform someone, you often need to describe something as well. And in stories, whether fiction or nonfiction, every author uses descriptions to tell about a person, place or a scene in the story. Finally, sometimes when you give an opinion or try to persuade someone, a description is necessary.

The main purpose of descriptive writing is for describing persons, places, or things. Effective descriptive writing will help the reader form a picture in their mind. For example, a friend may say to you, "I went on vacation to a beach." In your mind you can imagine a beach and water, but the sand could be different colors, water could be calm or rough, or the beach may be empty or crowded with people.

An effective description would include details related to the five senses. At the beach, a writer may describe the rough waves so they can be heard, the many people that can be seen, the aroma of fish in the air, the taste of salt, and the feel of the cold water on the body.

Using effective descriptive writing will improve writing skills, plus the reader will find your writing more interesting and exciting. Readers can embed themselves into the story, feeling as if they know the person, see the scenery, or hear the sounds.

Though you will use all four types of writing, descriptive writing will bring your writing alive filled with details, leading you to using more details, learn new vocabulary, and help you better understand new subject matter at school.



6. Sensory Exploration Exercise

Stimulate students' senses and engage their imaginations by having them create vivid descriptions based on touch, taste, smell, sound, and sight.

Introduce students to common logical fallacies, helping them identify and avoid these pitfalls in their persuasive writing.


14. Counterargument and Rebuttal Workshop



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
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
