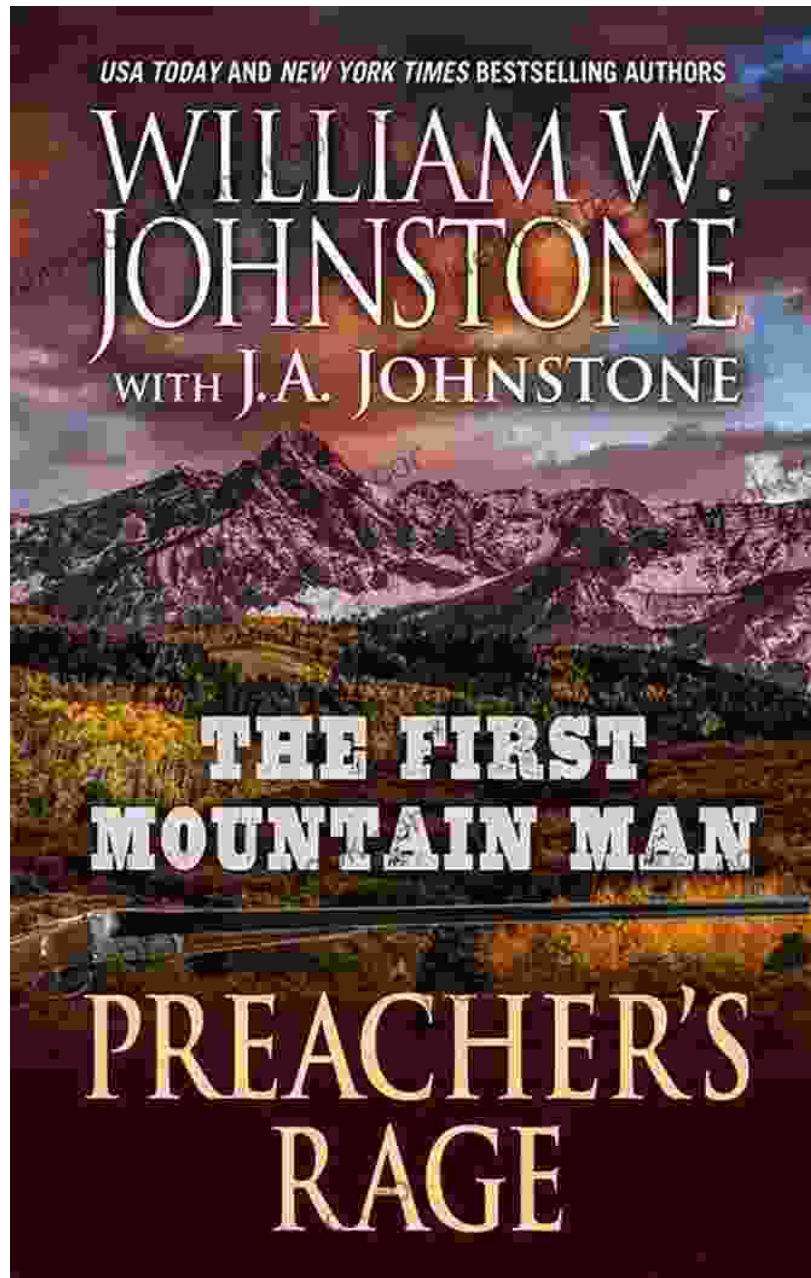


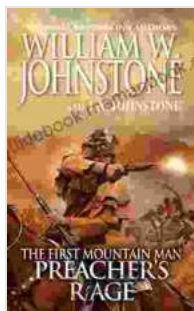
Preacher Rage Preacher: The First Mountain Man, Part 25

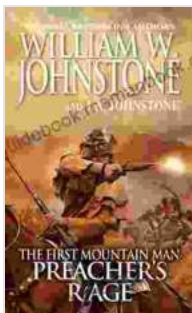
