


In the saddle all day, and at night, the stars Are his roof, and the sagebrush his mat."


In "The Yellow Rose of Texas," poet J. Frank Dobie describes the state flower of Texas. He writes,

The Texas Garden of Verses is an essential collection of poetry for anyone who loves Texas. It is a celebration of the state's beauty, diversity,



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
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
