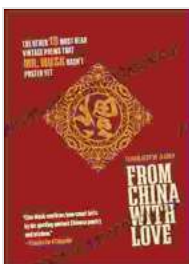
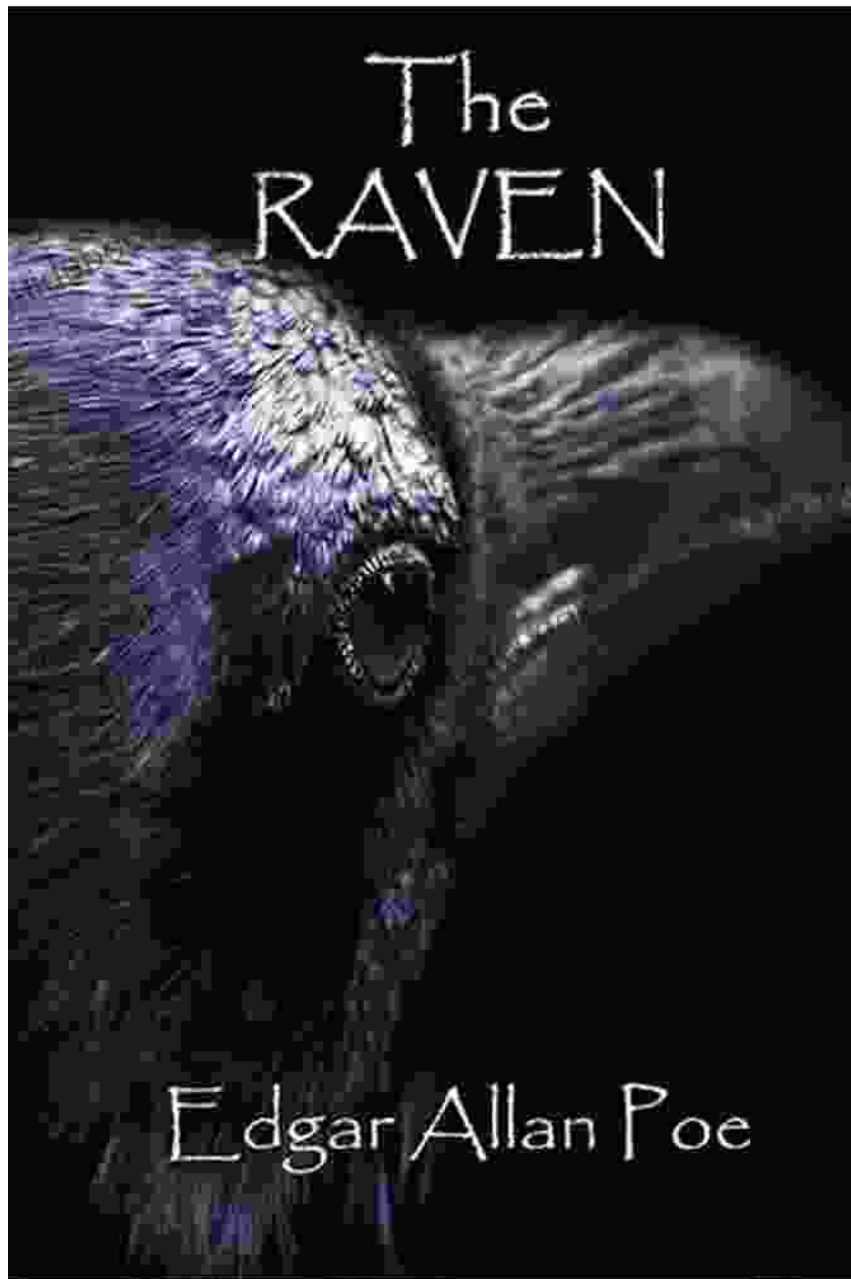


The Other 19 Most Read Vintage Poems That Mr Musk Hasn't Posted Yet
